# Textile History & Mill Transformation in Greenville

### **History:**

Greenville was once known as the textile capital of the world. The abundance of fast-moving rivers and proximity to cotton-growing areas made it an ideal location for manufacturing. The first mills were built in the 1870s and 1880s and continued to grow with the industry peaking in the 1970s.

At the height of the textile industry (1970s) most cities had one or two mills. In Greenville, however, entrepreneur and industrialist Ellison Adger Smyth with a

group of businessmen "... built 18 textile mills in Greenville, South Carolina. They form a crescent around the southern part of the town, which they called the textile crescent."

Greenville had become a leading producer of textiles, with mills such as **Poe Mill, Woodside Mill, and Judson Mill** employing thousands of workers. The city's population grew rapidly as people moved from rural farms to work in the mills. Textile companies built entire communities, known as mill villages, around their factories. These villages provided housing, schools, and stores for workers, creating a distinct social and economic structure in Greenville.

Judson Mill, one of the first fine goods mills built in the South, was built about 911. It was first known as the Westervelt Mill, its origin having been led by J. Vestervelt, who was its first president. The plant has 52,864 spindles and produce 11,000,000 yards of cloth annually.

After World War II, Greenville's textile industry began to decline due to international competition and automation. Many mills closed or moved overseas by the late 20th century, creating distinct economic challenges for the city and region.

#### Mills Repurposed:

<u>Judson Mill District</u> has transformed one of the city's largest mills into a modern community space that honors the rich history that built it.

- <u>Feed & Seed</u>: A nonprofit food hub serving local farmers and families in South Carolina- improving the health and well-being of all citizens by increasing access to nourishing local foods and establishing a truly sustainable food system built on profitable farms and independent markets.
- <u>Magnetic South Brewery:</u> Founded by SC natives, the new brewery offers a
  high-energy, family-friendly space that embodies the spirit of true Southern
  hospitality. "A place where the novice beer drinker and the craft beer
  enthusiast can share the same space to enjoy beer, food, and good times."
- Mill City Kitchen: Crafting pizza from scratch through live-fire cooking, and presenting an exquisite selection of wines and wine-based cocktails. Mill City has frequent community events, fundraisers, and free wine tastings every week fostering connections and community the way Judson Mill intended.
